




ST MARK

The life story of Mark the Evangelist starts in North Africa, in Cyrene, an ancient Greek town that had been taken over by the Romans.

HIs father, Aristobulus, was Greek, while his mother, Miriam, was Jewish. They were well off and his father was also involved in politics at a high level. They had settled in Cyrene The people of Cyrene often rebelled against Roman rule. As a result there was a steady flow of people moving out of Cyrene to avoid a turbulent life.



Mark accompanied his cousin Barnabas on the first missionary journey of the Apostle Paul. But at one point, Mark left them and returned home. Mark and Barnabas did not accompany Paul on his second missionary journey, but went to evangelize on their own. Mark also had a close relationship with Peter. "It is believed that Peter relied on Mark as his interpreter, as he was very literate. After So although Mark was not one of the twelve Apostles, he formed part of the foundation of the earliest Christian Community. In fact, he founded the Church in Alexandria


where he became Bishop. For a number of years, Mark preached the Good News and worked miracles, so that many people turned to the Christian Faith.

Children across school were invited to use the St Bede's prayer station in the corridor to send their own personal prayers to St Bede. Reception took part in a collective worship incorporating the prayer station.

CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

As part of our PSHE curriculum, all classes sequences of learning have been rooted in the principles of Catholic social teaching. These principles are rooted in Scripture, formed by the wisdom of Church leaders, and influenced by grassroots movements. All of the messages shared so far by classes have been prayerful and penitent focusing their messages on peace, reconciliation and forgiveness. Many parents



FIRE SAFETY!

Our Year 6 children spent the morning at Safety Works, an educational centre in Benwell focusing on fire, water and personal safety. The children engaged with various workshops and spent the morning understanding their role in keeping themselves and other safe. All children really enjoyed all of the workshops working with fire and police officers to learn what could happen if they don't put their personal safety first.









MARVELLOUS MATHS

At St Bede's, we utilise practical resources to enhance children's understanding of mathematics.. This approach spans across key stages including EYFS, KS1 and KS2. Children delve into the world of mathematics developing both their arithmetic and problem solving skills by using varied practical equipment. This may include numicon, tens frames or dienes to help children visualise concepts making them more tangible and engaging.

At home, children have been utilising Doodle Maths, an interactive app that provides personalised practice questions to strengthen arithmetic skills. The fun

and interactive nature of the app makes practicing maths enjoyable and effective.







WHAT A WONDERFUL WORD!

In English, children access a range of texts across the year. Research shows that there are only seven basic story plots and all stories belong to one of those genres. These plots are quest, Overcoming the Monster, Rags to Riches, Voyage and Return, Tragedy, Rebirth and Comedy. Following the seven stories approach all classes' reading and writing opportunities are planned to include all seven genres. We have had great pupil feedback this year about how this change in approach has made learning more accessible and interesting. We have also introduced a new sequence of learning to ensure continuity across all classes. This means all children know their end goal and what is expected of them. 



This is the second year the children have taken part in the program which has allowed them to have specialist dance training and work with Ballerinas from the Royal Ballet who took part in the program themselves when they were in Primary School.

After several dance classes and two days of intensive dance rehearsals the program ended with the children performing alongside the Ballerina at Dance City. 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
